Mission u offers 4 different scholarships. They cover your registration fee and hotel expense (only if your travel distance is 4 hours or longer). Each scholarship is for a first time attendee in each of the following categories:

- 1. Lib Claridy Scholarship: lay members
- 2. Nell Chance Scholarship: new member of United Women in Faith
- 3. Don Brill Scholarship: new clergy with 5 years or less as clergy
- 4. The Youth and Children's Scholarship: youth and children ages 6 16

Greetings from your *Alert* editor!

Vice-President Desiree Clarke has given me permission to use her space in this issue to remind everyone about an upcoming annual event, one that I always look forward to attending if I can. Bear with me as I try to help you see why this event is one of my favorite United Women in Faith gatherings.

When I taught high school English, many of my students dreaded studying poetry, especially anything written by Shakespeare or English poets from the Romantic Period because the phraseology was so different from their style of communication. We would read a short poem aloud in class, and their faces would turn into puzzled question marks—some would not even look up, hoping I would not ask them what the poet's point might be. Then, after guiding them to a basic understanding of the poem's meaning, a young boy (probably my son or one of his friends) would interject in frustration, "Well, why didn't he just come out and say so?!"

The following words from a sonnet by William Wordsworth initially presented such a challenge, but students could quickly relate when they overcame the unfamiliar style of the poetic language.

The world is too much with us; late and soon, Getting and spending we lay waste our powers; Little we see in Nature that is ours; We have given our hearts away, a sordid boon!



I think of this excerpt often as the world is "too much with us" (I'm sure you also have those days when you have the world calling on you from every direction). Sometimes we long for just a day or so to get away from the hustle and bustle of daily obligations. To be honest, we probably feel this way as we return from a family vacation!

Now, I hope you can see why I always look forward to our special retreat in October at Blue Lake. If you have never attended, you are missing an amazing time of getting closer to God and the beautiful world He created for us to enjoy. Our worship, workshop, and fellowship experiences help us bond as sisters in our faith. 

#### <u>SOUTHEASTERN JURIDSICTION of UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH</u>



I became a Methodist at the age of 5, and I am embarrassed to say I had no idea about the hierarchy of our church—local, district, conference, jurisdiction, etc.—until I joined United Methodist Women. Having worked through the many layers of the United Women in Faith, I am now the Southeastern Jurisdiction (SEJ) president.

I thought it might be helpful to see a *CliffsNotes* version of United Women in Faith jurisdictions. A jurisdiction consists of geographically related conferences, with The United Methodist Church having five jurisdictions throughout the United States. The Southeastern Jurisdiction has 14 conferences, as seen in the illustration above.

As a ministry of The United Methodist Church, UWF jurisdictions provide spiritual formation, leadership development, and worship opportunities for all throughout the Southeastern Jurisdiction and beyond. We believe that informed, trained, and challenged Christians *can* bring much-needed transformation to the church and communities all over the world when we rely on the strength of our all-powerful Lord Jesus.

United Women in Faith's predecessor organizations established social service programs across the United States at the turn of the 20th century in response to the needs of marginalized and vulnerable communities—newly arrived immigrants, freed Blacks, the working poor, and indigenous peoples. Many of these programs survive today as independent, autonomous non-profit agencies referred to as National Mission Institutions. Located across the United States, United Women in Faith National Office assists these organizations through grants, technical support, and member involvement.

Thirty National Mission Institutions are within the Southeastern Jurisdiction that are empowering women, caring for children, educating youth, housing the neglected, advocating for social justice issues, creating economic opportunities, and changing neighborhoods.

Within each UWF jurisdiction, elected Directors and Program Advisory Groups (PAG) have input with the National Board of Directors about the programs and planning of the organization. We plan events, host book studies, keep in touch with conference officers, support National programs, and more!

As you can see from this brief description of how UWF jurisdictions work, each UWFaith member is called to become informed and trained to face the challenges Christians must overcome to spread Christ's transformative love throughout the church and communities around the world. Let us live victoriously under the reassurance that we CAN do all things through Christ who strengthens us!

With the love of Christ in our hearts, we can think about new and innovative ways that we can grow our membership. Try some of the following:

- 1) Invite your co-workers, neighbors, relatives, and friends to join you at a hands-on project.
- 2) Invite them to a Mission u event.
- 3) Celebrate United Women in Faith Sunday, a great time to open your doors to others.
- 4) Invite them on a site visit to a project that your circle or unit supports.

There are many ways to invite potential members to the table, where you will always want to make them feel loved and welcomed into your group.

One thing you probably should not do at the beginning is to invite them to a regular United Women in Faith monthly or bi-monthly meeting. Because that's usually a business meeting, it may be too much for a newcomer to take in and then consider being a part of.

On another note, don't forget members that are no longer able to attend church or your regular meetings. Remember the contributions and gifts that they offered the organization. At least three times a year think about small things that your membership can do, such as these:

- 1) deliver a small gift of appreciation;
- 2) send a simple thinking-of-you card;
- 3) drop off a meal that's been prepared at the church for some other event;
- 4) make a phone call, or send a text message.

#### Where your money goes:

United Women in Faith is trusted with pledges and donations from individual members as well as mission partners and anonymous donors who have a heart for mission. The national office is committed to good stewardship of this generous support. When local members give, a portion of the Pledge to Mission is kept by their respective unit and conference for their own administrative and membership development (A&MD) expenses as well as local mission. The remainder of the Pledge and the other channels of Mission Giving are forwarded to the national office. Therefore, our members' giving supports local, national, and international work aligned with our mission!

- † The Five Channels of Giving system provides various ways that our members give undesignated funds to our organization. At the national level, the elected Board of Directors vote on the budgeted spending for each year. - † Members can also give to projects on our Designated and Supplementary Projects List, which is updated each year. We currently have an active Legacy Fund Endowment Campaign, which will be an ongoing support of income, ensuring that our important work will always continue. *On March 23, 2025, we celebrated 156 years of faith, hope, and love in action!* Celebrating the 2025 Day of Giving with a gift to the United Women in Faith Legacy Endowment Fund helped us to provide for future generations. One hundred percent of the offering goes to the focus projects for that year. For more than 150 years, United Women in Faith members have taken action to turn faith, hope, and love into work on behalf of women, children, and youth in every corner of the world. United Women in Faith invites women from all over to gather locally to give through A Call to Prayer and Self-Denial.
- † The importance of sustained giving: Consider the impact YOU can make through 150 Legacy Builder: With the Legacy Builder, you can help move our mission steadily forward by making a monthly gift of \$18.69 or more.

In this thought-provoking episode of the podcast "Am I the Right Person?," Ben engages in deeply insightful conversations with Margaret Wheatley, an icon in organizational leadership, and Debra Rienstra, author of *Refugia Faith: Seeking Hidden Shelters, Ordinary Wonder, and the Healing of the Earth.* Wheatley paints an unflinching picture of the future, citing escalating climate issues, political tensions, and social unrest. Despite this outlook, she argues that meaningful, spiritually-based work can still be done. By facing the harsh realities, humans can focus on values like kindness, generosity, and community.

† Podcast Season Two Episode 5 – The BTS Center Solidarity with the sojourners | ResourceUMC

In Washington, D.C. Multiple denominational leaders gathered for a webinar to discuss the United Methodist response to immigrant justice and United Methodists across the connection, as well as all interested parties, are invited to join the conversation. "Solidarity with the Sojourner: Understanding U.S. Immigration and Our Call to Respond" was held on Feb. 10. "This webinar provided an in-depth overview of the current U.S. immigration landscape and explore the challenges immigrant communities face and the policies shaping their lives," explains Rev. Kendal McBroom, General Board of Church and Society's Director of Civil Human Rights, one of the speakers for the event. "Together, we [reflected] on our faith's call to action and discuss[ed] practical ways United Methodists can respond."

Through our support, these programs reach and teach many women and children that are looking for a great cause to promote in the field and at home.

Alabama Arise advocates for legislation in Alabama to alleviate poverty. On March 20, seven United Women in Faith members from the Southeast District attended Arise's Legislative Day. We learned about current legislative issues and had the opportunity meet with our state senators to share our concerns. # SUMMER READING SUGGESTIONS



# **EASY DOES IT!**

Here's a good recipe to use for your big summer get-togethers. We can thank Peggy Pelt of St. Andrews UMC, Panama City, in the Panhandle District for sharing it with us.

#### **Easy Brunswick Stew**

2 15 oz. containers Lloyd's barbeque\* in original sauce (use 2 of 3 meat choices – beef, pork, chicken)

16 oz. can cream style corn

16 oz. can whole kernel corn, drained

16 oz. can tomato sauce (or diced tomatoes)

16 oz. can lima beans, drained

16 oz. can English peas, drained

2 16 oz. cans sliced (or diced) potatoes

1 large onion, chopped

2 T. Worcestershire sauce

2 T. oleo

1/4 cup BBQ sauce

½ T. black pepper (or to taste)

Mix all ingredients in crock pot and simmer several hours. (Can also be cooked on stove, brought to boil, and simmered 25 – 30 minutes – but I think it's better in the crock pot – and less trouble too.)

Freezes well.
