Message From the President



We are already into the third month of 2018! How many United Methodist Women events and meetings have you attended—local circle meetings, Prayer & Self-Denial, District Annual Day, Conference Annual Day? United Methodist Women are busy! Our Purpose includes four major focal points: to be a community of women, to know God, to develop a creative, supportive fellowship, to expand concepts of mission.

This year many of us have already participated in activities that incorporate all four focal points. We delight in the fact we are an inclusive group; all are invited, and dues are not a part of membership. We do pledge to United Methodist Women above and beyond our tithes and offerings to our churches to support services and ministries for women, children, and youth.

We find spiritual growth through our service, mission studies, and commitment to share our love for Christ throughout the world. As a missional arm of the United Methodist Church, we strive to advocate and serve. If you have read the February 2018 *response*, you saw the maps that show the missions and organizations that our pledges and special giving support. From 2016 to 2018 more than \$10 million annually was allocated for national and international projects. United Methodist Women support 150 international programs carried out by up to 116 organizations in more than 110 countries. Nationally United Methodist Women support some 99 mission institutions, spiritual growth programs, mission education and service and advocacy.

As with any thriving organization, membership is vital to the success of United Methodist Women. At District Annual Day, we conducted a Service of Remembrance for twelve women who meant a great deal to us and to United Methodist Women. SOCIAL ACTION

DAYS FOR GIRLS PROJECT

In 2008, Celeste Mergens was working in community development for an NGO in Kenya. In the wake of the country's post-election violence, she witnessed a tremendous rise in the number of girls in orphanages. "What happens to these girls when they menstruate?" Mergens wondered. She quickly learned that the girls stay in their rooms, sitting on a piece of cardboard, missing out on school and work. What they desperately needed, in Kenya and many other parts of the world, was access to feminine hygiene items.



Thus, the non-profit Days for Girls was born, which provides washable, sustainable hygiene kits to girls and women all over the world. Each hygiene kit lasts 2-4 years, giving back months of missed education and opportunity to these girls.

The simple Days for Girls hygiene kits have a tremendous impact on women's and children's lives. Girls no longer have to miss days of school every month. And when girls are educated, they feed their families and lift their entire society, breaking the cycle of poverty. In addition, the availability of hygiene kits gives girls and women back their dignity, shields them from abuse, and protects their health.

The Dothan District can become involved in Days for Girls. We can form a team and sew hygiene kits for distribution. It is possible to purchase materials at wholesale prices through Days for Girls and hand-sew beautiful and sustainable kits that can change girls' and women's lives.

For further inspiration, read this story in the <u>UMW Newsletter</u> about a group of United Methodist Women members who formed a team and sewed kits for Days for Girls.

Please feel free to contact me for more information about forming a team. We can set a day to sew, fellowship, lunch together, and truly make a difference for women and children. It will be rewarding and fun!

TREASURER

A new year, new goals and a new district treasurer! I am Carolyn McInnis, and I am happy to be serving as our district treasurer. We have a new remittance form to start this new year. It is a combination of the old forms. If you need copies of the new form or have any questions, please contact me. Our conference treasurer also posted links to the local forms on the conference website.

One of the differences that you will notice on the new remittance form is that our conference is no longer financially supporting the different agencies that have been known as our "Conference Specials" in the past. If your unit wishes to continue to support these agencies, your treasurer will need to send the money directly to them. I will be happy to supply you with the agencies' addresses.

Instead of the "Conference Specials," we are now asked to give \$10 per active member for our conference giving. REMEMBER, this is not our Pledge to Mission. This donation goes to the Dumas Wesley Community Center in Mobile (the only United Methodist Women's mission institution in our conference), Mission u, our conference's Assembly offering, and Administration and Membership Development. The Administration and Membership Development portion helps us pay our expenses and run our programs and meetings throughout the year.

Our district also has the Mattie Kolb Scholarship that is given to a student or students from our district each year to help them with their education. The suggested donation per member for this scholarship is \$2. The Mattie Kolb Scholarship is now listed on the form under Supplementary Gifts.

The conference donation and the Mattie Kolb Scholarship donation are NOT part of your pledge. The pledge to mission that your unit sends to the district goes to the national office to help with the United Methodist Women's missions throughout the United States and the world. A CALL TO PRAYER AND SELF-DENIAL

One of the ways that United Methodist Women serve is through our Call to Prayer and Self-Denial program. The 2018 Call to Prayer and Self-Denial offering will provide educational opportunities for women and girls who are chronically underserved and marginalized: economically disadvantaged and displaced groups, such as female-headed households and low-income families. Education and leadership development programs may include child development and after-school programs, GED and ESL classes, job readiness, life skills and livelihood training, scholarships, workshops and seminars. This offering is on a four-year rotation, so it does not go to the same groups each year.

PROGRAM RESOURCES

In 2011, all universities in North Korea were shut down for an entire year, and except for the

270 students at the all-male Pyongyang University of Science and Technology, all students were sent to construction fields. Suki Kim accepted a job teaching English at Pyongyang, and over the next six months, she ate three meals a day with her young charges, while struggling to teach them to write and carefully telling them about the world beyond their borders, always aware that the more they knew, the more they risked. **The Art of Healing the Wounded Soul** Cynthia Ruchti Abingdon Press, 2015

In *Tattered and Mended*, author Cynthia Ruchti offers an invitation to think about soul-mending as a divine art form, like artisans who re-



claim beauty from the broken, frayed and hopelessly shattered, to show us that God doesn't just heal wounded souls, God heals artfully. With a gentle touch and personable wisdom, she opens the door to a gallery of the reclaimed and restored, reflecting on stories not unlike your own and helps you discover that even the most threadbare soul can once again find healing and hope.
