

Rev. J. Walker Epps

Rev. J. Walker Epps currently serves as the District Superintendent of the Dothan District of the Alabama-West Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church. Appointed to this position in July of 2008, Epps was previously the superintendent of the Marianna/Panama City District for two years.

He was raised in Headland, Alabama, where he attended the public schools and the Headland Methodist Church. His parents were Julian W. and Mary Ligon Solomon Epps, and he has one sister, Malinda Morris of Headland. Epps graduated from Birmingham-Southern College in 1971 and from Boston University School of Theology in 1974. In 1971 Epps married Lynn Thomas of Dothan, and they have two children, Micah who lives in Charlotte, NC, and Ellise, who lives in Headland, AL. After living in parsonages for thirty-four years, Walker and Lynn now reside in the family home in Headland.

Epps was a pastor in the Alabama-West Florida Conference for thirty-two years before being appointed to the Cabinet. Appointments served include, Cloverdale in Dothan, Greensboro, Mary Esther, FL, Andalusia FUMC, and Enterprise FUMC. Epps is on the Boards of Trustees of Birmingham-Southern College, the Methodist Homes Corporation, and The United Methodist Foundation.

An avid reader, Epps enjoys history and biographies, good fiction, and the works of Thomas Merton. His dream is to become a mentor, or coach, or spiritual friend to a person or two who would like such a friend.



Rev. Dr. Clayton Childers

Rev. Clayton Childers grew up in Atlanta Georgia during the days of the Civil Rights movement and the Vietnam War. Both were formative in his upbringing. After serving in the local church for sixteen years in Virginia and South Carolina, Rev. Childers came in 2001 to work at the United Methodist General Board of Church and Society on Capitol Hill in Washington DC.

In his current position as Director of Conference Relations, he has traveled widely teaching about the call of the church to social action and advocacy. "As people of faith we need to think and talk about what we are for," says Childers, "not just what we are against. We need to present our message in positive and inviting ways, painting a picture of a preferred future. This is the secret of Jesus ministry. Jesus painted a picture of an alternative Kingdom, the reign of God on earth as it is in heaven".

As Director for Conference Relations Rev. Childers has represented GBCS in 4 of the US Annual Conferences (areas), as well as in the Philippines Liberia, Nigeria, Egypt, Palestine, Israel, Turkey, Zimbabwe, Uganda, Democratic Republic of Congo, The Bahamas, Ukraine, Czech Republic, Russia, Kazakhstan and Germany. In addition, he has enjoyed hosting numerous UM leaders and groups at the United Methodist building in Washington, DC. These have included training events with Directors of Connectional Ministries, District Superintendents, Annual Conference Lay Leaders, Conference Elder/Deacon Probationers, District Pastor Trainings, seminary classes, college groups, youth groups, and confirmation classes.

Rev. Childers holds degrees from Furman University, Southeastern Seminary, and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Candler School of Theology, Emory University with an emphasis in Christian education.

He is married to the Rev. Denise Matz Childers, a pastor in the Virginia Conference currently serving at St. George's United Methodist Church in Fairfax, Virginia. They have two daughters, Allison, age 24 and Carly, age 20.

Bishop William Wesley Morris

William Wesley Morris was born in Baltimore, Maryland and was educated in the Baltimore school system. He graduated from Ohio Wesleyan with an A.B. degree, Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary with a B.D. degree, Scarritt College with an M.A. degree with distinction, and Vanderbilt University with D. Min. degree.

While serving student appointments, he was ordained deacon in 1959 and elder in 1961. He served Bethany Methodist Church, Chicago Illinois; Union Avenue Community Methodist Church, Chicago, Illinois; Christ Methodist Church, Chicago. Illinois; Stanley Methodist Church, Chattanooga, Tennessee; John Wesley United Methodist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, and First United Methodist Church, Gallatin, Tennessee. He also served as an Associate Council Director, Council Director and District Superintendent of the Clarksville and Murfreesboro Districts, and on the General Council on Ministries.

On July 15, 1992, he was elected bishop of the United Methodist Church at the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, where he was assigned to the Alabama-West Florida Area. In July of 2000, he was assigned to the Nashville Area. He served as president of the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits from 2000 to 2004, and is currently a Trustee at Emory University.

He was married to the late Mary Head Morris of McMinnville, Tennessee, and they have four children: Loretta, Eva, Michael, and Mark. In 2006, he married Princilla Smart Evans.





It will also be offered on Thursday, July 22 for those who want to take an additional study—Sudan or the general issue, Joy to the World: Mission in the Age of Global Christianity. I encourage each District to send your members for training and to teach those outstanding studies in your units.

Approximately 2000 of those present at Assembly in St. Louis had the opportunity to participate as one of the groups in the May 1 nationwide rally to protest the anti-immigration measure passed in Arizona that they fear will lead to racial profiling. United Methodist Women carried a sign that read:

Because We Believe . . . WE ACT FOR IMMIGRANT RIGHTS

Harriett Olsen, deputy general secretary of the Women's Division stated, "This is a particularly urgent moment . . . Laws like the one in Arizona will lead to caste laws and legalized racial profiling. As people of faith, we must declare: This is not just." Phoenix Bishop Minerva Carcano said the "faith-based public witness" showed that immigration justice is more than a political issue. It is at the very core of what it means to be a people of faith. We stand for immigration rights." Interfaith rally participants included Methodist, Catholic and Muslim leaders. Bishop Carcano urged United Methodist Women to petition U.S. Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano about our nation's "broken immigration policies that can lead to racial profiling, arbitrary detention and deportation.

The Council of Bishops at its spring meeting in Columbus, Ohio, offered prayer and support to Bishop Carcano in her opposition to the new Arizona immigration law. In response to a request from Iowa Area Bishop Julius Trimble, several bishops signed a large poster with a statement calling on The United Methodist Church "to recognize humane, comprehensive immigration reform as the faith issue that it is and hold our officials accountable."
