REPORTS OF THE MISSION COORDINATORS

EDUCATION & INTERPRETATION

There are several tasks under the job description of Education and Interpretation Coordinator. These include: interpreting and educating members about "where the money goes", Mission Today promotion, and encouraging mission studies at the local and district levels. Membership on the Conference Board of Global Ministries and the Mission u Planning Team are expected, as well. In addition to performing these jobs, study boards were prepared and displayed at the appropriate meetings.

The E and I Coordinator and the Treasurer work in tandem to promote transparency and understanding of how pledges are secured and sent to the National Office of United Methodist Women for work with women, children and youth in this country and around the world. The Five Channels of Giving provide dollars well-spent with agencies such as Dumas Wesley in Mobile and so many other deserving groups.

Mission Today participation is down by 11 units this year compared to 2017. The reporting form has been simplified over the past few years, but perhaps, drawing continuous attention to it will help get more participation. Mission studies at the local and district had fewer attendees in 2018, but the studies that were presented had good attendance. Please see accompanying charts at the end of this report. Three thousand fifty two women in 146 units in 8 districts make up the membership in the Alabama –West Florida Conference of United Methodist Women.

Training with local units was changed up somewhat this past year with more generalized training for several offices at the same session with break-out training for presidents and treasurers in some districts. This worked well, especially with smaller units. The Workbook continues to be a great resource tool for all who are involved in training and leadership roles. With so many resources available (especially on conference website), jobs are made easier, and recruiting officers may also be easier.

All in all, 2018 was a very good year for United Methodist Women in the AWF Conference. Moving around the conference for meetings has been a positive experience and seems to be getting more attention from first-time attendees. Communication continues to be a key factor, and it is improving all the time.

The winning entry letter, to be shared from the platform during the Membership Nurture & Outreach report time, tells us



about the remarkable accomplishments of this "seasoned" woman who exemplifies the attributes of a United Methodist Women, woman.

The 2018 summary of the eight districts in the Alabama-West Florida United Methodist Women MN&O report captured several notable challenges for our membership. The Memorial and Celebration of Life will capture ninety-three members that have gone to Glory; the "lost for other reasons" includes the deceased members, but also captures the members who've had to move into other locations that might include a nursing home, another state closer to children for health reasons and even "just didn't want to be a UMW Local Unit or member anymore."

It's here. 150 years ago on March 23, 1869 a small group of women braved a legendary torrential rain to gather at Tremont Methodist Episcopal Church in Boston, Massachusetts, and organized for mission. The women established the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, a predecessor of United Methodist Women, and galvanized women around the country to raise money to send a doctor, Clara Swain, and a teacher, Isabella Thoburn, to India as missionaries to serve the women of that nation. What has happened since is so amazing. As the anniversary date of March 23, 2019 gets closer we have not stopped our mission focus for women, children and youth who are STILL the most at risk in society today. We will celebrate with cake and programs and skits and trinkets to hand out; we'll make mention of those who've forged a path for us through the muck and mire and prayerfully lift up those who'll go on ahead with the mission. There may not be the same agendas or meetings or events style and content, but we'll still gather to encourage, affirm, be in relationship, engage, respond, share...the Vision of turning Faith, Hope and Love in Action on behalf of women, children and youth around the world.

SOCIAL ACTION

The members of the Alabama-West Florida United Methodist Women continue active service in our communities, our country and around the world. These are just a few ways we actively advocate in Mission.

Charter for Racial Justice

Our Charter for Racial Justice activities include holding programs on the Charter in several units. For example, members of the Foley unit in the Baypines District participated in, and were instrumental in organizing, a multicultural worship experience at their church. Several members in the Baypines District participate in the Path to Peace movement, a multi-racial organization in south Baldwin County, which is working toward racial reconciliation and peace, and have participated in a multiracial Bible study with the same goal. In the Dothan District, the Dothan First unit participated in worship at a church of a different ethnic background, gave a Special Mission Recognition pin to a Racial Justice advocate, watched a video on the Charter, and held discussions of response articles and reading program books related to the Charter. In the Montgomery-Prattville District, the Locust Bluff unit created and facilitated an annual multicultural festival and a Rainbow event that highlights the customs and artifacts of different countries and ethnic groups.

ISSUE PRIORITIES: 2017-2020

<u>Climate justice</u>: continues to be a topic of study and action by our districts. The Montgomery-Opelika District held a study that focused on plastic pollution, encouraging the use of fabric shopping bags and eliminating plastic whenever possible. The Mobile District acted to educate with "Be Just, Be Green."

<u>Maternal and Child Health</u>: Many units donated UMCOR kits. Some are Myrtle Grove (Pensacola District), 60+ school kits; Auburn (Montgomery-Opelika District) 60

health care kits; units in the Baypines District donated

flood buckets, school kits, and health kits; the Mobile District Local UMW Units, 400-plus health kits.

Economic Inequality: In the Mobile district, members supported the Sybil H. Smith Family Village with donations of needed items and volunteered at Dumas Wesley Community Center. Units in the Dothan District, Demopolis District and others also supported Dumas Wesley/Sybil Smith. They also provided meals and personal care items at McKemie Place shelter for women in Mobile. McKemie Place was also supported by others, including the Baypines District.

<u>Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass</u>
<u>Incarceration</u>: Through our membership in Alabama
Arise, the AWF United Methodist Women, as well as
many individual members, participated in efforts to
improve the lives of those living in poverty by lobbying
the Alabama State Legislature on social justice issues.

- Delegate names shall be published in the Alert, which contains the call to the Annual Meeting three months preceding the Jurisdiction Quadrennial Meeting.

VII. NOMINEES TO NATIONAL UNITED METHODIST WOMEN Art. V, Section 3 and 4b, p. 143

The Committee on Nominations shall nominate two nominees and one alternate for membership on the **National United Methodist Women Board of Directors** to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the conference organization prior to the Jurisdiction meeting.

- 1. The Committee on Nominations shall present the names to the Executive Committee at the summer meeting.
- 2. The Committee on Nominations shall present the names of three nominees to the Executive Committee at the summer meeting to be considered by National United Methodist Women to serve on the Program Advisory Group of the United Methodist Women National Organization.
- 3. The names of the nominees shall be published in the issue of the ALERT which contains the call to the Annual Meeting with the consent of the nominee(s).
- 4. Additional names may be nominated from the floor of the Annual Meeting with the consent of the nominee.
- 5. The names of those elected will be sent to the United Methodist Women National Office.

Are percentages added or are the two membership totals added to reach percentage? Answer:


Membership is based on beginning and ending membership totals of the district **USING AN AVERAGE OF THE TWO**. Each event **ATTENDANCE IS RANKED BY** points 10 through 80 - the one with the most points is winner. Percentages are not added - points are totaled.

For example: Dothan District has a total average membership of 492. Their Day Apart (Spiritual Enrichment Day) recorded 91 attending or 18%. Thus 80 points for that event *IF* that is the highest percentage reported from the eight districts. The points are added just before conference Annual Day and the district with the most points gets the award. Points are awarded on a 10 point increment scale; 80 points is the max for the largest attendance at that event.






