FINANCIAL MEDLEY

The Women's Division budget for 1983 is \$16,254,050, the largest ever. This is based on the pledge-to-mission giving of each member. In 1982 it cost \$1,795.53 per hour to support mission through the Women's Division. In 1983 it will be higher. Has your unit calculated the minutes/hours which it supports through the pledge it sends to the district treasurer?

"Where does the money go?" is a frequent question. Many resources provide answers, and Response magazine is one of the best. It is the official magazine of United Methodist Women, needed by every member if she is to understand the program and outreach of the organization. Increasing the number of subscriptions and the readership is another centennial goal. Consider giving subscriptions as Christmas gifts.

"Why undesignated giving?" is a second common question. "I like to know where my money goes." In hundreds of mission institutions it is undesignated giving (pledge to mission) that helps underwrite core budget: rent, fuel, utilities, salaries, administration. It is the "meat and potatoes" operating money to provide the buildings, staff and volunteers which make the program possible. Response describes programs in many such institutions. Undesignated money provides pensions and medical benefits for approximately 650 retired missionaries and deaconesses annually, as well as helping to underwrite the salaries of active missionaries. Names of these persons and their place of residence/work are listed in the Prayer Calendar.

"Where does mission money come from?" is an important question, infrequently asked. The answer? Approximately one-third of the annual budget of the Board of Global Ministries comes from undesignated giving of 1.2 million members of United Methodist Women. It is a larger percent, and a larger dollar amount than that provided by 9.4 million church members through World Service giving.

Because pledge-to-mission money is so vital to the mission outreach, be alert to those who seek money from United Methodist Women through junk mailings or for programs with no relation to the United Methodist Church. Question anyone who suggests uses of money which violate the policies of United Methodist Women.

The Centennial Celebration was officially launched at the Assembly, April, 1982. There are two financial goals in which each unit and each member's participation is vital: an increase in annual pledge giving and the establishment of a special Centennial Celebration Fund. To accomplish these, each unit will need to increase its annual pledge during 1983, 1984 and 1985 by at least 5 percent. Additionally, each member is asked to make a personal contribution of \$1 per year during 1983, 1984, and 1985 to the Fund. There are new remittance forms for treasurers this year with line 13 for reporting the Centennial Celebration Fund (If the names and addresses of your officers were sent to Service Center as

The United Methodist Women of the Alabama-West Florida Conference conducted a World Development Workshop, February 25-27, at Blue Lake for conference executive committee members, district presidents, vice presidents, mission coordinators for Christian Global Concerns, and mission coordinators for Christian Social Involvement. Other interested persons who wanted to learn about world

issues and needs were also encouraged to come.

The purpose of the workshop was to provide United Methodist Women with an opportunity for greater understanding to study the relationships between local communities and developing nations and to enable United Methodist Women to participate at the community level in development.

Ms. Barbara Weaver, executive secretary for developmental education from the Women's Division conducted the workshop with help from Ms. Virginia Vargas from Lima, Peru, who is itenerating in the United States with the Institute for Policy Studies. Ms. Vargas shared with the group her experiences with the women of Peru-their concerns, needs, and fears. Others from the conference taking part on the leadership team for the week-end were: Dr. Thomas Lane Butts, who spoke on development from the perspective of the Christian faith; Mrs. Annella Trobaugh, who spoke on Women's concerns; Michelle Johnson, who spoke on Refugee Resettlement; and Judy Cumbie, who spoke on peace with justice.

Members of the planning team were Anne Dalton, Eloise McGucken, Jane Weekley, and Mary Willis.

Plans are for World Development Workshops and learning seminar experiences to be brought into the districts and local units later in 1983 and 1984. Knowledge gained from this encounter will serve as a springboard for alter workshops in our conference. Watch for details coming soon!

The Alabama West Florida United Methodist Women has designated March and April as United Methodist Women Recognition months. This is a time for each unit to emphasize membership. To make UMW highly visible and to acquaint the church on United Methodist Women, its purpose, its work, its goals, and its mission.

Following are some suggestions for the observance:

- 1. Have United Methodist Women as visible as possible at the Church Service. Consult your minister concerning participation in the Church Service on that Sunday, then refer to the Council on Ministries concerning details.
- 2. UMW preside or take part in the Service such as reading the scripture, giving the prayer, leading the responsive reading, etc.
- 3. Present a Special Mission recognition Pin (during the Service) to your Pastor or to a special member, explaining the meaning.
- 4. Secure a woman speaker for the Service.
- Give name tags to members of UMW; recognize them during the Service.
- Place posters around the church showing involvement and outreach of UMW.

- 7. Distribute leaflets "Who are United Methodist Women?" and "20 Questions" (free for postage from Service Center) plus local activities and time of meetings to each person attending Service.
- 8. UMW serve as greeters, ushers, and in taking collection during the Service.
- 9. Allow one member to give a three-to-five minute talk on "What UMW Means to Me" or about the work of UMW in general. This could include an invitation to non-members to join, Sit together during the Service.
- 10. Follow up with membership tea or some form of fellowship.
