"The World Thank Offering is one of the United Methodist Women's five channels of undesignated Mission Giving. Traditionally, this offering is collected during a special service or program during the fall season. This channel of Mission Giving is an opportunity for individuals to respond to God's abundance and grace with spontaneous gifts of gratitude. The funds collected are used in the total program of mission and advocacy in the United States and around the world. " (United Methodist Women's website)

Spiritual Growth



The Dothan District's Spiritual Growth Day was held on Saturday, August 17th at First United Methodist Church in Enterprise. There was approximately 40 in attendance. The "School to Prison pipeline" focus was the topic of our program.

Denver Sasser, Ministry Leader for Celebrate Recovery (CR) at Enterprise First United Methodist Church, discussed his experiences in prison ministry. Celebrate Recovery is a Christ-based recovery program for anyone with a hurt, hang-up or habit. Celebrate Recovery is led by John and Cheryl Baker who attend Saddleback Church, which is Rick and Kay Warren's church, in Lake Forest, Ca. Celebrate Recovery Inside serves men or women in prison/jail.

Denver is working with the prisons in the panhandle of Florida, especially Holmes County. He shared some of his personal experiences from these prison visits. Inmates are in great need of spiritual growth and personal development. Step Study, a Celebrate Recovery program, is used with these men. Leaders have been identified and are assisting inside. Most realize they have committed a crime and are trying to learn to accept their stay inside, many with life sentences.

Denver never knows when he arrives if he will be allowed inside the prison due to circumstances that may have occurred inside the prison. Yet, he believes in bringing God and His love for us, showing His grace and mercy to all, to the incarcerated men and will continue to return to the prisons. Sharing our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and teaching the men how to share is important. Denver wants us to know the problems of overcrowding and old facilities in prisons across the nation. He encourages us to read all the data, statistics and information found on our UMW site, <u>unit-edmethodistwomen.org</u>.

Jean Johnson provided us with activities that will be used for The Walk at Tutwiler Prison for Women. (Please see more information about these activities in Jean's article.)

Information and Statistics on the School-to-Prison Pipeline



- The school-to-prison pipeline is a term used to describe how children and youth of color are rerouted by systems and institutions, funneled away from educational success and towards the criminal justice system.
- African American students are three times more likely than white students to be suspended and expelled. Twelve percent of African American girls are suspended, compared to two percent of white girls. Native American students are less than one percent of the student population, but comprise three percent of students experiencing expulsion and two percent of students suspended out of school.
- Native American youth are held in juvenile detention facilities at three times the rate of white youth.
- Thirty-one percent of students experiencing school-based arrests are African American, though African American children and youth make up only sixteen percent of total school enrollment.
- The school-to-prison pipeline is not the result of any one single action, but of many factors coming together, including:
 - Implicit Racial and Gender Biases
 - Excessive Out-of-School Suspensions and Expulsions
 - Zero Tolerance Policies
 - Status Offenses
- Together, United Methodist Women can interrupt the pipeline.

From the United Methodist Book of Discipline

"We recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons. We rejoice in the gifts that particular ethnic histories and cultures bring to our total life. We commend and encourage the self-awareness of all racial and ethnic groups and oppressed people that leads them to demand their just and equal rights as members of society." (Social Principles, ¶ 162 B)

Our Values

Racial justice is an ongoing focus of United Methodist Women mission work. We conduct regular racial justice workshops with members, and work in coalition with human and civil rights groups to track hate-crimes and to promote racial justice in the United States and the world.

United Methodist Women's Charter for Racial Justice was created and adopted by the Women's Division in 1978 and successfully adopted by the whole denomination in 1980. General Conference has consecutively readopted it, every eight years since, most recently in 2008. The Charter continues our urgent call for study and action on the principles and goals of its vision.

Read, learn and act . . . these action verbs describe what United Methodist Women are all about. I am proud to be a part of this organization because we are not just bemoaning the social issues around us; we are actually making a difference.

We made tremendous progress with Days for Girls over the past year. We finished 115 kits recently and our sewing group has a goal of 100 more for their fall sewing project. Yes, we are making a difference for women and girls around the world.

Kairos is one of the most effective prison ministries in the world. Saturday we will prepare colorful paper chain links with messages of hope and scriptures to be added to a huge paper chain for the women of Kairos #57 on September 19-21, 2019. We will also decorate placemats for the women to use for the many meals shared together with the Kairos Team. We will prepare and donate meal tickets for the women. And, we will decorate and write cards to the "Women in White" with words of support for them during this spiritual journey, one that we pray will help them turn to God and realize the extent of God's grace and mercy in their lives.
