



Conference Treasurer's Report

Is it too late for my donation to my local unit to count towards our 2020 Pledge?

NO. Your local unit has until the end of November to get all funds to your district treasurer. The District Treasurer has until December 10th to get all funds to the Conference Treasurer. All monies received after the due date will be held for the 2021 year.

What is the difference in our Pledge money, Supplementary funds and the Love Offering?

Pledge money is comprised of unrestricted donations to UMW, World Thanks offering, mission cards, memorials, and special mission recognition (pins and/or donations). 100% of this goes from the local unit to the district to the conference. At least 85% of that goes to National to fund our mission institutions, social and spiritual endeavors, leadership training, and national operating costs. The 15% the conference withholds is what funds our administrative and membership development costs both for the district and conference. For a local unit to receive the Five-star status, each of the five areas listed for the pledge has to have received donations in that area.

Supplementary funds are sent to nationals but are restricted funds. These funds include the Call to Prayer, UMCOR, and other specified designations.

The Love Offering stays in our conference and never leaves except the part that is designated by a percentage to go to Dumas Wesley, Mission u and an offering we make every two years at the Jurisdictional or Assembly events. A part of this Love Offering is also used for our administrative and membership development costs such as having our finances reviewed, events and meetings, office supplies, subscriptions and memberships, our website and other costs of running our organization.

Why is it important to give to any of the above-named funding groups?

Because we care about United Methodist Women and we are passionate about our mission to women, children and youth. Although many individuals and local units do hands on missions and financial assistance, we have committed dollars to institutions around the globe to help with the same missions we do locally. Each of our local units may and do support organizations that help women, children and youth in our respected areas, but the larger mission institutions like Dumas Wesley must have private funds to keep their doors open. They depend on each of our individual dollars to serve their constituents.

The pledge is decided by vote each summer for the following year. The district and conference, as well as national, make projections on that pledge to create their budgets. When the pledge falls short, we often over-state the budget (expenses) for that year and could create a problem in meeting the expectations of those counting on our funds, like Dumas Wesley and others.



What are UMW's Social Justice Priorities for the 2021-2024 Quadrennium? United Methodist Women's Mission Priorities for the 2021 – 2024 Quadrennium are:

- Climate Justice, with a particular focus on Just Energy 4 All campaign.

Why are we only doing two priorities? What about Maternal Health and Economic Justice?

As we move forward in this moment, we do so with a great sense of intention and discernment. To be impactful, we are constantly assessing what is needed in this moment and where our strengths lie. Reducing the number of priority issues for this quadrennium enables us to focus the resources and time of members and national staff, go deeper into each of the issues we're engaging, and develop stronger local and national partnerships in these areas.

In this time of diminishing resources, this kind of focus makes us more effective and have greater impact for good.

As we wind down our work on Maternal and Child Health and Economic Justice/Living Wage be yearend, we are confident that the organizations we've partnered with over the past quadrennium will continue to advance Justine and equality in these areas.

And so, beginning in 2021, our Social Justice Priorities will be Mass Incarceration/Criminalization of Communities of Color, with a particular focus on the Interrupting the School to Prison Pipeline campaign, and Climate Justice, with a particular focus on Just Energy 4 All campaign.


What about our work on gender equality and racial justice?

United Methodist Women is a women's mission organization whose founding and subsequent work evidenced the efficacy of women to lead, achieve, and answer God's calling in a time when women's roles in church and society were stymied. **Gender justice and women's leadership development are part of United Methodist Women's core commitments and will always be a key component of our work.**

Likewise, **United Methodist Women has a long-standing commitment to eradicating racism.** We began this work over 100 years ago and regularly recommit to fighting racism and anti-racist work. We know that all people are beloved in God's eyes, and until they are loved in the eyes of all, our work persists.

Recent videos of extrajudicial killings of George Floyd and other people of color has forced the church and the nation to confront the inequities in law enforcement and institutional racism. Our work on Mass Incarceration/Criminalization of Communities of Color and the Interrupting the School to Prison Pipeline campaign and Climate Justice are most important at this time. Our work on these issues consistently reveals their intersectionality with gender inequality and racial justice, placing us in a unique position to lead ad the nation assesses the role of systemic racism.

Education and Interpretation Report

Introducing a New Model and Timeline for Mission u Curricula

We are excited to share a few important updates about Mission u in 2021 and beyond!

First, after hearing feedback from many in our Mission u community on the importance of the *Finding Peace in an Anxious World* study, we are glad to let you know that the Board has approved offering this study for adults again in 2021, alongside *Pushout, Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom*, and youth and children's studies on violence. This will hopefully allow more participants to engage *Finding Peace* in person next year. We plan to offer training for this study and, like a regular second-year study, conferences can choose whether they will offer all three studies.

Secondly, we are excited to implement a new model for Mission u in 2022 and beyond by delivering to our members and the broader church a new Transformative Biblical Curricula, with one curriculum for adults, one for youth, and one for children developed each year. In this new model, curricula will focus on a central scriptural and/or theological theme, and incorporate spiritual growth, social action, and the global context of the church. This approach integrates crucial elements of our previous mission studies while also creating a more flexible, modern curriculum that can be used both at Mission u and in broader contexts, such as the local church, small group virtual settings, and ecumenically. As we continue to develop this, we will be sharing more about changes to training and possible schedules for Mission u events.

For reference, the timeline below shows what our topics of study will be through 2024.

Red Bird Mission

Hundreds of lives depend on Red Bird Mission in Beverly, Kentucky. For starters, it's the largest employer in a 35-mile radius in the southeastern part of the state, tucked into a remote corner of Clay County at the intersection of Bell and Leslie counties.

Nearly 100 people are employed by the agency, which provides a wide range of services in the impoverished region, including child development, community aid ministries, elderly and family services, women and children's ministries, economic opportunities, and community housing improvement.

Next year, Red Bird celebrates its 100th anniversary.

"People count on us," said Executive Director Kari Collins. "We need to be there for them, because we're in an area where the opportunities are so limited."


About 40 percent of the population is at the national poverty rate or lower, and unemployment is always higher than the national average. Collins estimated that about 10 to 20 percent of the residents have just given up looking for work. Drug addiction is also at higher-than-average levels.

When state and local officials began ordering shutdowns due to COVID-19, the demand for Red Bird Mission began to skyrocket. The number of clients who used the emergency food pantry and dispensary for baby items nearly doubled.

The pandemic forced the temporary closure of the community store, which stocks donated clothing, furniture and household items. And though the dental clinic stopped performing nonessential dental care, a teledentistry service was launched.

Meals on Wheels became even more vital, with the local senior center temporarily closed. Seniors who ate their main meal at the center were added to the home-delivery program. Teachers at the Red Bird School started online learning, but some of their students had no access to the internet. They had to prepare packets of homework assignments to be picked up or delivered to homes.

"It was a challenge beyond words," Collins said. "But we knew we weren't alone, because this was happening all over the country. It's just that we're sitting in a part of the world that's so isolated, so poor and with a lack of transportation.

She said the longstanding partnership with United Methodist Women played a critical role in being able to keep up with the additional demands, which stretched the nonprofit's \$4.6 million annual budget. Aside from the annual national mission institution grant, United Methodist Women also donated an emergency grant of \$40,000 to cover unexpected expenses due to the pandemic.

"United Methodist Women has always paid close attention to the special needs of this community and has always responded to our requests for assistance," Collins said. "They founded us, and they have kept us going. They are truly the hands and feet of this mission."

In the beginning, when some programs had to be put on hold, Collins was faced with having to lay off some of her staff. But the emergency funding from United Methodist Women, along with a payroll protection assistance from the federal government, allowed her to maintain most of her work force. To keep staff safe, the mission now has a 14-step "Health at Work" plan that includes staggered times in the office, daily sanitizing of workstations and temperature checks.

One of the mission's most crucial programs is Work Camp. The program draws about 2,400 volunteers from churches, schools or service organizations for short- or long-term mission trips for projects such as housing repairs and building accessibility ramps for elderly and low-income families.

Because the people stay in cabins, paying the mission room and board, the camp had to be delayed about a month so that a health and safety plan could be put in place. Many volunteers whose trips were canceled sent a donation instead, which was directed to hire local people to tackle the jobs they would have done on the mission.


Collins anticipates a "new normal" regarding health guidelines going forward. She also worries about a drop in charitable giving, which Red Bird Mission depends on to survive.

"It's easy to get discouraged," Collins said. "But all the acts of kindness we've witnessed these past few months restore my faith in humanity. At the heart of it, people really do care for one another and take care of one another, especially in the worst of times."

The members of the PAG have been elected to represent the membership of the organization at the National level in such areas as: programming, leadership development, membership growth, spiritual growth, and service/advocacy.




