What Are the Five Channels of Mission Giving and How are They Related to Our District Pledge? 2019 Dothan District Pledge to Mission Received \$5,027.89

The Five Channels of Mission Giving are the undesignated gifts that United Methodist Women members give to help empower and improve the lives of women, children, and youth in the United States and around the world. The combination of these "channels," or areas, of giving make up our district Pledge to Mission.

- 1. Pledge to Mission Each woman gives the amount that she feels able to give to her local unit. There is no set amount! The local unit then sends part or all of this money to the district. The district then sends it to the conference. The conference United Methodist Women pledges a specific amount to United Methodist Women's national office for mission with women, children, and youth. The conference retains a designated percent to be used for district and conference administration and membership development expenses and sends the rest to the national office.
- 2. Special Mission Recognition Pins and Certificates These pins come with certificates and offer a meaningful way to honor members who have dedicated their time and effort to service. Gift amounts range from \$40 to \$2,000. Pins are purchased through your local unit treasurer.
- 3. Gift to Mission Cards These cards are a wonderful way to make a gift to United Methodist Women in honor of someone and to send the honoree a beautiful card. Cards are purchased from the local or district treasurer for \$5 per card. The following cards are available: Congratulations, Thank You, A Baby, In the Service of Christ, On Your Special Day, Thinking of You, Happy Birthday, Peace, and assorted Christmas cards.
- 4. Gift in Memory Cards Give a gift in memory of a member, a friend, or anyone, in any amount of \$5 or more. Gift in Memory cards, available free from your local or district treasurer, may be sent to the family of the deceased. These cards have a removable attachment that is given to the local treasurer along with the donation.
- 5. World Thank Offering The World Thank Offering is an opportunity for individuals to respond to God's abundance and grace with spontaneous gifts of gratitude. The funds collected are used in the United Methodist Women's total program of mission in the United States and around the world.

These five "channels" of giving provide us with ways to help fulfill the Purpose of United Methodist Women and to meet our 2019 district pledge of \$14,740. Our Pledge to Mission and World Thank Offering are simply our gifts for mission. The Special Mission Recognition Pins, Gift to Mission Cards, and Gift in Memory Cards also give us the opportunity to recognize and honor others while helping women, children, and youth throughout the world.

If you feel that you have already pledged as much as you can, then please consider buying a card from United Methodist Women instead of from a store. The cards are a simple way of helping. The United Methodist Women cards are only \$5 per card and most of that money goes to improve the lives of women, children, and youth.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH

Spiritual growth leads to action. There may be no other justice issue that affects us as human trafficking does. Awakening to the reality of human trafficking is essential for spiritual growth. True awakening breaks our hearts open; then love is possible. Acting on the loving impulse to eradicate trafficking can change the world. Knowing the truth can help set the prisoners free.

Jesus spent his ministry serving those forgotten by his culture. We must also serve those the world has forgotten.

United Methodist Women members are followers of Jesus Christ who live their faith through acts of justice and mercy.

The fact sheet below has been developed by United Methodist Women. It is important to know what is happening. While some of these statistics may be dated, the human trafficking is still an important issue. Please read and pray for the women and children that are being trafficked. Ask this question: What can I do or my United Methodist Women's group do to help recognize and prevent trafficking?

HUMAN TRAFFICKING FACT SHEET

Definition: The United Nations defines human trafficking as the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation. Trafficking includes forcing people into prostitution or other forms of sexual exploitation. Children can also be victims, trafficked often for prostitution, illegal adoptions, trafficking for early marriage or recruitment as beggars or sporting contestants.

Why it Happens: Globalization has created a widening gap in wealth between countries and made many people "victims of the excesses of a global economic system that rewards wealth and exploits the poor." Such pressure has severely impacted women seeking a way to make a living, and "has had a direct impact on the movement of workers, the degradation of work and income distribution, and increased the conditions for human trafficking. International Human Sexual Trafficking is inextricably linked to the feminization of poverty. Seventy percent of the world's poor are women. Most poor women live in developing countries, and tolerate terrible conditions because economically or culturally, there are limited options available to them."

Estimated Scale: Human trafficking is the second largest and fastest growing criminal industry in the world. The total annual revenue for trafficking in persons is estimated to be \$150 billion and impacts an estimated 20.9 million people around the world. The United States is the second highest destination in the world for trafficked women. An estimated 20,000 victims, some estimates are as high as 50,000, are trafficked into the U.S. each year.

Policy: The problem of trafficking in women has been addressed at the international, national, and some state levels. In 2000 President Bill Clinton signed and the Senate ratified the UN Protocol to Prevent, Suppress, and Punish Trafficking in Persons, especially Women and Children. The US Department of State annually publishes a *Trafficking in Persons Report* on the efforts of governments to combat trafficking and issues a report to Congress as required under the Trafficking Victims Protection Act. The report categorizes countries as to whether they fully comply with the Acts minimum standards to prohibit and punish those involved in trafficking. To read the report visit www.state.gov

Who is Being Trafficked: According to the United Nations, 71 percent of people trafficked are women and girls and 28 percent are children.

Where Can Victims of Trafficking Be Found: Victims of trafficking can be found in all types of establishments and locations, in rural, suburban and urban settings, on streets, in houses, in trailers, and on farms. Victims cam be found as agriculture and landscaping workers; in factories (garment, meat-packing, industrial welding); street panhandling/peddling; in hotels and homes (housekeepers, nannies, or servile marriages); on day labor sites and internet sites (Craigslist and others); in door-to-door sales; in restaurants, bars, and

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other service industries (nail or hair salons); and in the commercial sex industry (street prostitution, strip clubs, massage parlors, escort services, phone chat lines, and residential brothels).

DOTHAN DISTRICT UMW SPOTLIGHT ON SOCIAL ACTION

As United Methodist Women, we should be more aware of the social action priorities of our wonderful organization. If something we read sparks our interest, it is time for action. This article's focus is on Criminalization of Communities of Color & Mass Incarceration.

In the love of Christ, who came to save those who are lost and vulnerable, we urge the creation of a genuinely new system for the care and restoration of victims, offenders, criminal justice officials, and the community as a whole. Restorative justice grows out of biblical authority, which emphasizes a right relationship with God, self, and community.

(Social Principle Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church 2012, ¶164)

The only women's prison in the State of Alabama is Julia Tutwiler Women's Prison in Wetumpka, AL, an aged facility (opened in 1942) that has had serious problems over the years. The facility was named in honor of the "Angel of the Stockades," Julia S. Tutwiler, a noted Alabama educator and crusader for inmate education, classification, and improving prison conditions. In spite of this legacy, five years ago, DOJ investigators found "unabated staff-on-prisoner sexual abuse and harassment" and an atmosphere where the "women at Tutwiler universally fear for their safety." These conditions were aggravated by the fact that the prison is chronically understaffed. Although Tutwiler is still understaffed, steps have been taken to improve conditions related to sexual abuse.

Some prisoners come through Tutwiler on their way to another facility, but many women call this place their home. They search for ways to deal with the lack of privacy, outbreaks of violence and other dangers of prison life. Some of the women have found salvation behind bars, often through contact with those from outside who have come in to minister to them and love them.

Kairos is a Christian faith-based ministry which addresses the spiritual needs of the incarcerated by sharing the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. A team of Godly women enters the prison for four days to meet with 35 women who have been chosen by the prison chaplain. They talk, share meals with, listen, teach, witness, and love the women. Expressions of the love of Christ through action is essential for Kairos. People from "outside" may send messages of love to the women on the walk.

As United Methodist Women of the Dothan District, we are considering ways to send love and support to the women of this year's Kairos Walk to be held at Tutwiler in September. Ideas include decorated posters, a letter of encouragement to the "women in white," decorated placemats, small-sized toiletries, and other items.
