# CONSTITUTION OF UNITED METHODIST WOMEN IN THE CONFERENCE

# Article 6. Meetings and Elections

- 1. a) There shall be an annual meeting of the conference organization of United Methodist Women, at which time there shall be presented a program designed to meet the needs of the women of the conference in harmony with the PURPOSE and the plans and responsibilities of the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries. Officers and the Committee on Nominations shall be elected, the necessary business transacted and pledges made for the ensuing year.
- 2. b) The voting body of the annual meeting of the conference organization shall be composed of:
  - One representatives from each local unit
  - Conference Executive Committee
  - Bishop
  - District Executive Committee
  - District Superintendents
  - Directors of the Women's Division residing within the Conference
  - Officers of the jurisdiction organization residing within the bounds of the Conference

### ABOUT OUR GUEST MISSION AGENCIES

### **DUMAS WESLEY...**

The Mission of the **Dumas Wesley Community Center** of Mobile, Alabama is to educate, empower and enrich the local community through collaborative programs of Christian service that: Provide for immediate human needs, strengthen family life, develop leadership and encourage personal responsibility.

The Dumas Wesley Community Center was founded in 1903 by the United Methodist Women and has been serving the community for over a hundred years. Dumas Wesley originally started its mission work by serving poor women and children who worked in the cotton mills of the Crichton community in Mobile. Over the years it has evolved to meet the needs of the community, becoming a multi-service center offering after school care, tutoring, a food pantry, a day program for senior citizens, a transportation program for senior citizens and neighborhood outreach. The Sybil H. Smith Family Village, a transitional housing program, was opened in 1999 to address the gap in services along the housing continuum in Mobile for families who need more time to work on goals than is permissible in emergency housing settings. The village has served nearly 350 women from Mobile and surrounding counties.

Dumas Wesley is a neighborhood based non-profit organization in Crichton. The majority of households in Crichton are headed by single mothers with an average family income of less than \$10,000 per year. 69% of the clients served directly by Dumas Wesley have low-income and approximately 95% are minority.

# **OPEN DOOR COMMUNITY HOUSE...**

In the spirit of Christian ministry, the mission of Open Door Community House, Inc. is to work in partnership with other area service providers to meet basic needs and to empower low income individuals to realize their full potential as children of God.

Open Door Community House began its journey with Ms. Addie Greeley, a deaconess in the Methodist Church and Miss Lizzie Evans who came to Columbus in 1924 and began doing children's programming in the basement of Hamp Steven's Methodist Church in Bibb City. They believed that the community needed a way to respond to the suffering experienced after one of the largest mills operation in the area closed and the people were in need. Mrs. George Matthews was waiting for the need to be identified. She insisted that space be provided to minister to the needs of the community, so a small cottage at the rear of Hamp Stevens was donated. Ms. Matthews organized a small group, which included Mr. Jess Schrimshire and Mrs. Ralph King. The group, members of St. Luke Methodist Church, bonded and set about working together to run the active community center.

Today Open Door Community House offers opportunities for spiritual growth, established relationships with individuals and families in need, and works cooperatively with other area service agencies to bring about reconciliation in the lives of people in the community.

Throughout its history, Open Door has expanded to meet the increasing needs of the community, which has responded by opening its heart to those in need. Open Door works with children, women, and families to embody Christ and empower those who need help and hope. It has been an incarnational ministry since its founding – serving as the hands and feet of Christ – as it opens doors of faith, hope and opportunity to al that seek to help.

THE VASHTI CENTER... The center is a ministry of the United Methodist Church and a mission of the United Methodist Women. In 1903 Annie Heath, a Methodist missionary, recognized a need for a home and guidance for young "orphan, needy and dependent girls" in the Thomasville, Georgia area. Mr. & Mrs. W. P. Blasingame gave her a nine-room house, and named it the "Vashti Industrial School for Girls" in memory of Mr. Blasingame's mother.

In 1907, after outgrowing the house, La Cubana, an old cigar factory, was discovered and the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church South bought 65 acres and buildings from the estate of Archibold T. Macintyre. The next year, seventy girls moved in.

Vashti had waited patiently year after year for the heart of a great church to discover her needs and respond generously. And, in 1919, the Centenary Movement of the Methodist Episcopal Church South raised \$75,000 to restore the old cigar factory.

In 1953, the building was renovated again, and newer, more modern buildings rose up around her. Four new classrooms were added and all three floors were completely repaired and renovated. It continued to be used as a school and administration offices. The third floor became teachers' apartments. In 1978, Vashti admitted its first boys.

Vashti has been a place of miracles for 100 plus years. Today, we are still a United Methodist non-profit organization offering a continuum of care for children in need, includes: RBWO (boys & girls) ages 6 thru 17; Bishop Hall Charter School serving at risk children from grades 9 through 12; Clinic Services – Psychiatric and Nursing assessments – individual, group and family therapies with group skills training; and Community Service – ages 5 thru 17 which offers Intensive Family/Individual Intervention and Community Support.

UNITED COMMUNITY CENTERS, INC..... Founded in March of 1903, United Community Centers, Inc is a multi-service community center providing a variety of services for individuals and families living in low income neighborhoods, in Southwest Birmingham. UCC is a non-profit organization and received funding from individuals, local UM Churches civic groups, foundations, United Way of Alabama, National Missions Institutions and Women's Division of The General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church. UCC is one of 94 agencies nationally designated as a National Mission Institution by the United Methodist Church. Over the years, the UCC has developed and operated eight community outreach mission centers in the Birmingham area. The center is located in the Riley neighborhood of southwest Birmingham, Alabama. It is a non-profit organization designed to enhance the quality of life through human services to children, youth and senior adults and families to providing holistic programs that foster a sense of well being in all individuals, to develop leaders for tomorrow, and create a compassionate atmosphere fro all individuals within the community. United Community Centers, Inc enriches the quality of life in the communities we serve by providing outreach programs and services that assist individuals, families and communities in addressing their needs. In doing so, we bear witness to Christ's love and concern for all, so that "they may have life and have it more abundantly". The programs offered are:





The Cooperative School of Christian Mission is an annual event. This event is sponsored by Conference Board of Global Ministries, Church & Society and United Methodist Women and is a wonderful time to learn about mission. The 2012 Cooperative School of Christian Mission was held at Huntingdon College on August 2-5 with an attendance total of 103 people. Our Spiritual Growth Study, Immigration in the Bible, was taught by The Rev. Jim Clark from Tennessee Conference, The Rev.
